CLIMATE FINANCE

What is a fair contribution, and how can the funds reach the most vulnerable communities?

Oxfam Sweden, together with partners from Latin America and the Caribbean, invites you to a half-day seminar to highlight the issue of loss and damage finance from a perspective of fairness and justice and the implications for Sweden.

The case of Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC) is of particular interest in terms of loss and damage. The region is home to a large number of Indigenous communities, and more than 40% of the world's biodiversity, resulting in profound and far reaching non-economic loss and damage in these communities, encompassing loss of life, cultural identity, and Indigenous and local knowledge, biodiversity and territory. Afro-descendant people living in traditional communities and rural communities, which have contributed very little to global greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, also face many of the worst impacts of climate change.

At the seminar, the Stockholm Environment Institute and Oxfam Sweden will present two new briefs that discuss the topic of loss and damage finance from a perspective of fairness and justice, as well as new, innovative instruments that could be implemented in Sweden to unlock additional finance for Loss and Damage.
